

# WHETU PAERANGI Stars in the Distant Horizon

Ehara tāku toa i te toa takitahi He toa takitini My strength is not as an individual But as a collective

During the Covid-19 crisis, the most profound impact for New Zealand have been in the areas of health and the economy. As New Zealand adapts to Alert Level 4 of the COVID-19 lockdown, it is important to note that the economic marginalisation due to social exclusion poses an added risk to health, especially of those who are most vulnerable.

For our most vulnerable whānau Māori, the impacts have been varied and include:

- the inability to feel safe in their own homes due to potential violence,
- the need for emergency housing support,
- the need for medical treatment and care if they have pre-existing health conditions, or if they actually contract the virus,
- food relief,
- accessing MSD benefits,
- and supporting our kaumatua and kuia who are now isolated as well as our special needs whānau.

For Māori in general, there is a significant cultural impact. This is because tikanga such as powhiri, karakia onsite, whānau huinga, marae huinga and of course tangihanga, cannot be applied to their full extent. Tikanga is described as 'mātauranga (traditional knowledge) in action' (Mead, 2013) so, not being able to exercise tikanga in a traditional way to show our aroha and manaakitanga, is central to Māori particularly when it comes to facilitate tangihanga (traditional funeral customs).

## Whetū Paerangi Kaupapa

Whetū Paerangi allows us to view the COVID-19 pandemic management within VisionWest through Kaupapa Māori culturally centred lens (DuBrin, 2013, p. 238) both philosophically, practically and in accordance to traditional Māori values of aroha, manaakitanga, mana, whakawhānaungatanga.

Whetū Paerangi represents our wayfinding narrative of how we utilise these four stars—see the table on page 3 – 4—to empower our VisionWest people and community to assist us in navigating our way through this pandemic for our whānau whakaraerae (vulnerable), such as kaumatua/kuia, whānau hauā (special needs), tamariki and rangatahi, whānau kainga kore (homeless), whānau rawakore (poverty), mātua takitahi (single parents), and our wider whānau.

These four key areas provide clear parameters to navigate our responsiveness from crisis management to the end of the recovery phase.

Whetū Paerangi are four simple but distinct key areas for me to monitor and support VisionWest in managing our COVID-19 response to the people we're called to serve, both internally and out in our communities.

# Whetū Paerangi Framework

It is important to note, Whetū Paerangi is not a separate operational arm to managing our organisation's response to the pandemic. It is a unique kaupapa Māori mechanism to complement and support our current pandemic management strategy and operational priorities. It is made up of comprehensive kaupapa Māori leadership and support that focusses on four key areas:

- 1. Te Whetū Kaupapa Whakahaere Pandemic crisis management and coordination.
- 2. Te Whetū Whakahaere Tikanga Pandemic tikanga oversight and supports.
- 3. Te Whetū Pāpāho Māori Pandemic Māori communications.
- 4. Te Whetū Rangapū Māori Pandemic Māori stakeholder partnerships.

As Whetū Paerangi is implemented for VisionWest's nationally across our 1600 plus workforce and volunteers, all COVID-19 information will be aligned to guidelines provided by the Ministry of Health, other Government departments, and local City Councils.


### Whetū Paerangi Leadership

Our Head of Māori Service Development Fred Astle leads and monitor our COVID-19 Māori responsiveness to ensure our kaupapa Māori approach to managing COVID-19 for Māori is aligned with the Whetū Paerangi framework. As a member of our Executive team, Senior Management team, Pandemic Management team, our VisionWest Kāhui Whakaruruhau and close connections with key external Māori leadership and services, Fred is able to utilise all key information to assist with successful navigation of our services to whānau, supporting staff, management and leadership in managing COVID-19 together internally and externally. Ongoing updated Kaupapa Māori information will be forthcoming.


